THE "VENUE" REPORT

The LBFC released its report "A Study of the Impact of Venue for Medical Professional Liability Actions" on February 3, 2020. Senate Resolution 2019-20 directed the LBFC to determine the impact of venue, or the geographic location where a legal dispute can be adjudicated, for medical professional liability actions as it pertains to several issues. These include: access to medical care; how the 2003 changes impacted availability of services and professional liability insurance; how the 2003 changes impacted compensation for medical negligence injuries and deaths; as well as how the current proposed amendment might impact these areas. The Pennsylvania Supreme Court agreed to delay review of the proposed amendment pending the release of the LBFC's report.

As directed by SR20, the LBFC staff held public hearings last June to accept testimony from affected parties including representatives of the health care industry, the insurance industry, the legal community, as well as other relevant stakeholders. Staff reviewed thousands of pages of documents and concluded it was not possible to measure the specific effects of tort reform, let alone venue, on issues such as physician and hospital availability, hospital services, the number of medical malpractice filings, the value of medical malpractice payments, or case duration.

The study did find that a change in venue, coupled with regionalization of hospital services, would likely create a less predictable market in the near term, which may result in rate destabilization in adjusting to the new rule. 
FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR...

FAQs...

HOW DOES AN LBFC PROJECT START?

The LBFC is authorized by law to conduct a wide range of research activities pertaining to the operation and performance of state-funded programs and agencies.

Projects come to the LBFC in one of three ways: the requirement of an LBFC study may be included in statute, or it may be requested through a House or Senate resolution, or in some circumstances an issue may be examined by staff at the discretion of the LBFC officers.

YESTERYEAR...2005

It was the year that we saw Steve Fossett fly solo nonstop around the world, Hurricane Katrina, and the founding of YouTube. That year, the LBFC issued a report entitled "The Potential Economic, Social, and Other Impacts of Expanding Sunday Hunting in Pennsylvania." In 2005, state hunters reported that they would hunt an average of 4.7 additional days a year if Sunday hunting was allowed during all seasons, which was an estimated economic impact, at that time, of \$629 million. In 2020, Pennsylvania hunters will be able to hunt on three Sundays due to the recently enacted Act 2019-107.

REPORTS FROM STAFF HO...

On October 28 & 29, 2019, the LBFC professional staff attended training on performance auditing presented by the Government Accountability Office's Center for Audit Excellence. Mr. John Needham, of the GAO, came to Harrisburg and led the LBFC staff through lessons and activities on the life cycle of a performance audit, including:

- GAO Yellow Book standards and phases of an audit
- Questions to ask in designing audit issues and objectives
- Utilizing different design tools, such as a design matrix and audit plan
- Data collection, analysis, and documenting evidence
- Developing, reaching agreement on, and communicating the report message.

Mr. Needham is experienced with government auditing and review from past experience as Assistant Inspector General for Auditing at the Small Business Administration, Director in the GAO's Acquisition and Sourcing Management Team, as well as head of management audits at the Tennessee Valley Authority's Office of Inspector General. He led reviews of acquisition and contracting practices at the Departments of Homeland Security, Defense, and the General Services Administration, including the government's response to Hurricane Katrina. The Center for Audit Excellence promotes good governance and the building of the institutional capacity of accountability organizations, such as LBFC, by providing high quality training. They offer fee-based courses in the areas of performance audits, institutional capacity, financial audits, leadership, and supervision.


